

Teaching Generations to Care

Fall Newsletter 2024

As the Friends group to the Adirondack Interpretive Center, the Adirondack Park Institute provides support for the Center's free educational and experiential programs that teach generations to care for the Adirondack Park's unique natural and cultural resources.

The Adirondack Park Institute (API) is a not-for-profit organization formed in 1989 funded through annual memberships, individual donations, and grants.

The Adirondack Park Institute (API) partnered with the dedicated team at the Adirondack Interpretive Center (AIC) in Newcomb to deliver engaging summer programs for locals and visitors to the Adirondack Park. While some trails remained partially closed due to 2023 flooding, the picturesque Rich Lake Trail reopened and was enjoyed by many.

While exploring the trails and enjoying the stunning landscape, visitors had the chance to meet API-sponsored Artist-in-Residence Helena Williams, who worked her craft and shared her insights. Interpretive Naturalist Intern Jillian Scocca also contributed by leading guided walks, engaging with visitors daily, and creating videos to share her observations with a broader audience.



Inside the Center, workshops, classes, lectures, and films complemented the AlC's thoughtfully curated exhibits and historical displays, showcasing the natural and cultural heritage of the Adirondack Park. Looking ahead to 2025, the AlC plans to complete the final 3.5 miles of trail repairs by late summer, with the trails reopening for public use. The staff is eager to celebrate this milestone with special events and tours in the coming seasons.



Artist in Residence Helena Williams

Helena, a wildlife illustrator and falconer from nearby North Creek, NY, shared her passion for the natural world through her artwork created while she spent the summer at the AIC. She taught visitors how to observe, record, and create, both on the trails and in structured learning sessions.




